Course Content:

This paper comprises:

- Orientation to Fieldwork Practicum given by the Faculty Supervisor at the beginning of the Course. The main themes expected to be covered in the Orientation Classes are Concept of Fieldwork Practicum; Components of Fieldwork Practicum; Significance of Fieldwork Practicum in Social Work Education; Roles and responsibilities of the Student, Faculty Supervisor and Agency Supervisor; Recording in Fieldwork Practicum.
- Observation visits to welfare, educational, developmental, industrial and allied agencies.
- Structured Experiences Laboratory to help students understand and practice various skills required for effective practice of Fieldwork Practicum.

Note: Each student is expected to spend eight hours per week in the Field / Agency and the Faculty Supervisor is expected to spend about eight hours per week for this paper by conducting Orientation Classes, arranging for Orientation Visits / Fieldwork Placement, conducting Structured Experience Laboratory classes, Field Visits for Supervision and Guidance, Individual Conferences and Group Conferences on a weekly basis, and Correction of Fieldwork Reports. Thus, the workload for this paper for each of the Faculty Supervisor may be considered equivalent to one full theory paper.
